Trip Announcement:
EAST FORK WHITE RIVER
Saturday July 13m 2019
Trip Sponsor: Richard Tekulve

Come and join us on Saturday July 13th for a leisurely 12.6 mile float down some very nice southern Indiana scenery as we partake on our annual East Fork White River trip. We will begin the journey at the DNR boat ramp located next to the historic, renovated Medora Covered Bridge.the bridge is considered the worlds longest historical covered bridge of its nature at 435 feet in length and built 144 years ago in 1875. After a brief walk-through and tour of the bridge we will enjoy a casual float downstream alongside several of Indiana's longest sandbars many of which are over a quarter of a mile in length. Nearing the half way point the river is joined by its largest tributary (Muscatatuck River) and henceforth the "Knobs" appear and begin to take a whole different scenario as tall bluffs over 300 feet prevail to the end .Our takeout will be at the DNR ramp just downstream from the old, historical two span Sparksville Iron Bridge built in 1890 and covering nearly the distance of the covered bridge at 420 feet.

The East Fork is one of only a small handful of reliable 24/7/365 streams in the state and should provide a steady, summertime current of 2-3 m.p.h. at normal levels. Last years 9.4 mile trip was from Brownstown to Medora and was paddled by 15 members. This section we will paddle was last ran as a HCKC trip event back in 2012 with 10 participants.

The put-in is 78 miles from the center of Indy. The best route is I-65 south to S.R. 11 (Exit 55) then S.R. 11 south for 5 miles to Seymour and U.S. 50. Turn right (west) onto 50 and go 11 miles to Brownstown and one mile past the courthouse. Here turn left (south) onto S.R. 135 and go 5 miles to jct. of S.R. 235 and turn right (west) onto 235 then proceed 3 miles to the covered bridge and a small park with the DNR boat ramp. For those using the DeLorme Indiana Atlas and Gazetteer it is on page 51 H-8.

Meeting Time and Place: 1030 AM @ Medora DNR Boat Ramp adjacent to S.R. 235 Bridge/Medora Covered

Bridge over river. (8 miles SW of Brownstown/ 2miles east of Medora)

Paddle Distance: 12.6 miles of casual, easy paddling Shuttle Distance: 16 miles (total) on blacktop roads

Time on River: 4-5 hours (not including mandatory lunch break stop)

Gradient: 1.4 feet per mile Average Width: 125' to 250' Take Out: Sparksville DNR Boat Ramp.

P.S. For those of you that have never experienced a slight "detour" off of the main road home, only a few miles to the east is perhaps one of Indiana"s most scenic drives. The Skyline Drive just a few miles south of Brownstown and 3 miles east of S.R. 135/Vallonia has four different vistas and a 1935 fire tower that have breathtaking views towering 400-500 feet over the Hoosier National Forest below

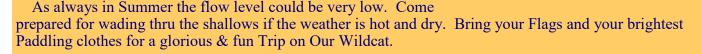
we can create a Major Spectacle as we pass thru the Festival grounds.

#### From Kokomo, Lafayette, or Indianapolis:

Take SR-931 North from SR-26 on the south edge of Kokomo. You will go thru several stop lights as you go North. Watch for the JCT with SR-22, at Markland Avenue; the Markland Mall is on your left, Hobby Lobby and White Castle are on your Right. Continue North on SR-931 to the VERY NEXT stop light, which is Carter Street or Waterworks Road. If you cross Wildcat Creek on 931 you have gone too far. Turn Left onto Carter Street.

After crossing the Carter Street Bridge over Wildcat Creek.

After crossing the Carter Street Bridge over Wildcat Creek, the entrance to Waterworks park will be on your Left in about 300-yards. Pass by the first park entrance, and look for a wooden shelter house with a parking lot in front of it.

#### From The North:

Enter Kokomo on SR-931 South. Watch for a McDonalds on the Left, and a Menards on the Right. After passing McDonalds and Menards you will then cross Wildcat Creek. Make a Right turn at the very next

Stop Light after crossing the Creek, which is Carter Street or Waterworks Road. After crossing the Carter Street Bridge over Wildcat Creek, the entrance to Waterworks park will be on your Left in about 300-yards.

Pass by the first park entrance, and look for a wooden shelter house with a parking lot in front of it.

**Practice!** In the club's kayak skills classes, I always start and end classes by telling students that the only way that they will truly "own" the skills that we teach is through practice. Well, the chickens have come home to roost for me.

On June 1, we had our annual open water rescue clinic where we worked on assisted and solo open water kayak reentries. I confess that I only work on of these skills preparing for this class and I found that two of my solo reentry skills had slipped away in the last year Well, I guess that I have to practice to keep my existing skills.

It is important to keep these rescue skills fresh because nothing makes a person tired and cold as flipping, attempting a reentry, failing, and having to try a 2<sup>nd</sup> or 3<sup>rd</sup> time. One should also practice skills these in conditions—people are much more likely to flip in 2-3 footers on Lake Michigan than on Eagle Creek. After practicing in conditions, people have a lot more confidence knowing that they can get back in their boats even in big water. As I tell my students and now myself, practice.

The other really cool thing about this clinic was that I learned as much as everyone else. Our fleet members have been getting additional training (e.g., the Seabrook Island and symposia) and they shared the tricks that they learned there with everyone else. We learned a safe/easy way to get in/out of our kayaks from a dock as well as more efficient ways to perform rescues.

LOCATION: Sea Kayak Training Weekend Warren Dunes State Park, Michigan

**DESCRIPTION:** 

Paddling along the beautiful dune covered shores of Lake Michigan. We will take advantage of opportunities for paddlers to develop their skills and confidence in paddling in waves, which are frequently present on large bodies of water. These opportunities may include launching and landing in surf, paddling in the surf zone, bracing and boat control in wind and waves. **EQUIPMENT:** A sea kayak 15 foot or longer with sealed bulkheads and sprayskirt is required. A

helmet is recommended when playing in surf. Experience in rough water conditions and open water recues is highly recommended. The lake is a lot of fun to play in, but wind and waves can make it challenging. Wet suit may be necessary, you will need to dress to the water temperature. **SKILL LEVEL:** Intermediate and those

advanced beginners wanting to develop skills in open water conditions.

The more I read about the island, the more excited I get about this trip. Dan has written a trip overview and is hoping to gauge the interest in this trip and an approximate number of people. Hi Folks. I saw Beaver Island on a map years ago and have always wondered. It's time to go see.....

**Location:** Beaver Island is the largest island in Lake Michigan (part of the 14 island Beaver Is Archipelago and is about thirty miles northwest from Charlevoix, Michigan. It is about thirteen miles top to bottom, roughly five wide. The island has a weird but interesting history.

Dates: September 15-20, 2019

**Paddling:** There is a 42 mile water trail that circumnavigates the island with rustic access to beach camping sites. There are several uninhabited islands north and west from two to five+ miles out. I'm told from a local that the shoreline is beautiful, interesting and the water super clear. Sounds like several good paddling opportunities including day trips or overnight

**Conditions:** It is in the middle of Lake Michigan so you know are unpredictable and can vary quite a lot. There are protected options due to the size of the island such as Paradise Bay and inland lakes. Town is about a mile away from camp so if all else fails we go in and get drunk as monkeys (just kidding, probably).

#### Logistics:

Ferry - Departs Charlevoix, MI Sunday, Sept.15 at 2:30 PM.

Returns from Beaver Is. Friday, Sept. 20 at 8:20 AM.

**Cost-** Beaver Island Boat Company

Per person: \$50 round trip Kayak carry on: \$50 round trip

Optional vehicle: variation in rates based on length & height \$220 +

I believe it would be good to have one vehicle (my pickup?) to throw gear in to get to the island and for transport while on island. I have a guy who can transport kayaks from dock to camp for us.

Ferry strategy will evolve depending on group size and ideas. The boat company does this all the time and is cool with long boats. Vehicles and kayaks need reservations, vehicles especially. I plan to get a spot for mine early so we at least have one. I'm told to not put this off, it's limited. Cost could be divided up. Vehicles going on the boat need to be there 1.5 hours before departure. Kayaks 1 hour.

Parking - \$5 a night if you leave a vehicle in their lot on Charlevoix. I'm game for advice and ideas.

#### Camping:

St. James Campground on north tip of island seems like the best bet.. Twelve sites, \$10 a night, no reservations, first come first served. I'm assured by my local dude we'll have no issue getting space. Potable water, pit toilets and about a mile from town. Can launch from camp (weather willing). There are also campsites along the shore of the island for additional options. There are some logistics and expense due to the ferry but, I think we can handle that. It's a new place for me and I think it could be a great trip. Dan Cavins

## Kayaking Skills Classes -

## Jim Sprandel

This year, we will offer three one-day introductory and intermediate skills sessions on Saturdays, July 20, and August 24. Each session is stand-alone so you can choose which you would like to attend. These classes are free for registered HCKC members.

Each session will offer introductory and intermediate training. In one group, we will cover the <u>ACA's Introduction to Kayaking course</u> that introduces you to the correct way to do basic strokes, safety issues, and how to talk kayak. The intermediate session is targeted to people who have already attended the Intro class and have paddled since them for at least one year.

Classes are small with less than 5 students per instructor so we often adapt our material to what our students are interested in covering or need to work on.

#### **Introduction to Paddling Class-**

**Target Paddlers**: HCKC members who have never taken a class or who want to tune up their basic strokes. Parents with children over 13 year old may enroll with their children.

Class Content: Here's a way to jumpstart your paddling! As a new kayaker, you may know how to move your boat around in calm water. We will work with you to make your paddling easier and more efficient—to give you more control over your boat. We will work on your basic knowledge, strokes, and other paddling skills that you may need to safely enjoy the sport. This course is based on the American Canoe Association "Introduction to Kayaking" course. This is also a great opportunity to ask any questions that you might have about paddling, equipment, or the Hoosier Canoe and Kayak Club.

Your instructor will first talk about the basics and then quickly get on the water to teach you how to move your boat forward, backwards, and sideways as well as how to turn and stop.

#### **Intermediate Kayak Class**

**Target Paddlers**: HCKC members who have: 1) completed an introductory class at least one year ago and 2) have practiced and are comfortable with their forward and turning strokes as well as with their draw and rudder maneuvers. This class is for recreational, touring, and sea kayak paddlers.

Class Content: Boat control, turning, and stroke efficiency are essential for Intermediate paddlers whether you are paddling on creeks, rivers, lakes, or oceans. You need to make your boat do what you want it to do. In this class, we will spend the entire class helping you to turn your boat faster, easier, and with more control as well as doing it more efficiently so you can paddle longer and faster. We may pick a focus area for a given so each class may have different content. The topic will be sent out to the Sea Kayak mailing list about one month before each class and posted to the class's calendar entry.

Class Size: Attendance for each class will be limited to 5 students for each instructor. Enrollees must be registered HCKC Members and will be accepted based on the date that they register through the HCKC Event Calendar or e-mail Jim Sprandel. Please do not sign up unless you can stay for the entire clinic (9:00 am to 3:30 pm).

## Training Event Report: HCKC's FIRST ACA L4 SWR in South Bend Indiana Richard Clapham

A Swift Water Rescue (SWR) L4 assessment in spring should be challenging, fun and, ideally, warm ..... With 10 participants, 3 Instructors (all internal from HCKC). FOOD and Drinks provided and a great location, the odds were in our favor. Apparently the Indiana weather had a different idea – Challenging it was, FUN was had, but as the weather changed from sun to snow over the course of the first day, and as we entered the water, the air temperature had dropped to freezing! However the water was fighting back, it wanted some willing victims – with a water temperature of 58 we had steam coming of the fast moving river and the swimming was warm!

On the Saturday morning everyone was able to stay warm and dry looking at reach techniques (starting with communication), progressing onto throwline work and advancing to cinches. As well as Knots. In the afternoon we moved onto the water with safe swimming, rescuing practice with lines, and the strainer situation. Strainers are very dangerous, and even as we slowed the water (as we could control the release) I think dealing with these was a surprise to all.

Sunday morning started where Saturday left off. ICE and SNOW. But our course catered for the weather. We had a dry session in the morning, covering a recap of the prior day we then worked through topics such as mechanical advantage techniques and anchor points. The Sun came out and by midday it was getting warm. We moved onto the water covering rescue pfd's and live bait, then came boat based rescues and scenarios!

We planned the SWR course to cover the full L4 syllabus – running from minimum risk rescue to high risk rescue methods over the course of 2 days. This was achieved with everyone giving positive feedback as they left. Many thanks to all as without everyones' co-operation we could not do this.

Eagle Creek paddles will be held on Tuesday afternoons and evenings again this year. These are unstructured paddles where HCKC members can explore the lake, train to develop speed/endurance, or practice skills. If you would like to paddle with other HCKC members, I would recommend coordinating that through the club bulletin board, Facebook or e-mail.

These Tuesday Evening paddles are provided for club members through a Partnership Agreement between Eagle Creek Park and the HCKC. The club "pays" for these park admissions by cleaning up the Eagle Creek shore line, supporting the park's Blue way project, and providing safety support for the weekend paddles provided by Jeff Coates and Eagle Creek Outfitters. I will send out a note on their Full Moon paddles in the next month. In the September newsletter, we will tell you how to help with the shore line clean-up

When: Tuesday, May14 through September 24, 2019

**Starting Time - Between 1:00 pm to Closing:** HCKC Members may use the pass to enter the park with their boats any time after 1:00 pm on the specified Tuesdays.

**Ending Time - Park Closing Time:** When you enter the park, look at the closing time posted at each of the park entrances since these times change during the year. They normally lock at least one of the gates at closing time.

#### Where to Launch: :

**Ramp near Discovery Center** — Enter the park at either the 56th Street or 71st Street entrance and follow the signs to the Discovery Center or "Go Ape!" Use the boat/kayak ramp across the parking lot from the Discovery Center (next to Go Ape).

**Marina Personal Boat Launch -** You can also launch from the personal boat launch next to the building with bathrooms near the Marina (Eagle Creek Outfitter). Do not launch at the beach at Eagle Creek Outfitters since it is reserved for their use.

**Note:** This pass is <u>not</u> valid at the Dandy Trail ramp at the south of 56<sup>th</sup> street near Ric's.

**2019 HCKC-Eagle Creek Pass:** HCKC Members **must** print the 2019 HCKC pass and show it to the Eagle Creek gate staff to get in without paying. The fee for park admittance is at least \$8 for a car with one kayak or canoe otherwise.

#### To Get the Pass:

Move your cursor over the Information Tab in the top menu and then click "2019 Eagle Creek Pass" in the menu that drops down

## Reminder—Get your 2019 Non-Motorized DNR Lake Permit

You must have a 2019 DNR Lake Permit if you want to paddle your boat in Indiana state parks, state-managed reservoirs, or state forests. Annual permits are still only \$5 per boat per year. The fine for paddling on Lake Monroe without a sticker is over \$100 and is enforced by the state's conservation officers.

Permits may be bought at the Indiana Government Center (402 W. Washington St., Room W160) in Indianapolis or at the property offices or entrance gates at state parks, reservoirs, and forests when they are staffed. If you go to the Boat, Sport, and Travel Show, you can also buy them at the DNR booth there. You can also buy your 2019 Annual State Park Entrance Pass from this site or at the Boat Show.

**Note**: Early in the season, attendants will be available at some launch ramps. However, not every ramp and not every day so be sure to check at the park you are going to before you head out.

## **HCKC Membership Renewal Changes**

When you go to renew your dues this year, you may notice two changes:

**Auto Renewal Membership Option** – Members may now elect to have a membership that automatically renews itself every year. No fuss and no reminder e-mails – your membership takes care of itself.

I have an opportunity for a few people to join me on a 1 week trip to the BWCAW in August. I have not yet chosen an entry point nor an entry date. I have time between semesters and family vacations during the August 8-24<sup>th</sup> period.

features a very photogenic outdoor model that some of you might recognize. If you wish to learn more about potential trips for the various entry points, please see Voyageur North Outfitters at <a href="https://www.vnorth.com/">https://www.vnorth.com/</a> or Sawbill Outfitters at <a href="https://sawbill.com/">https://sawbill.com/</a> or check out any of the other numerous outfitters in Ely, MN or up along Lake Superior.

We need to pick an entry point and an entry date, then get the permit. It is a 12-14 hour drive from Indianapolis so I prefer to take two days to get there. We can stay 4 nights in the BWCAW then take out and head home. So plan on 7-9 days total. This gives time to spend wandering around the stores in Ely to find all those things we just have to have.

There are numerous trips out of Ely up the Echo Trail and go up Little Indian Sioux or go out of the Numbered Lakes or we can head out of one of my favorites at Sawbill Lake. I am not looking for a death march trip but an opportunity to fish, take pictures, locate a few bears, and enjoy time just lazing around. My last trip we set up base camp on Sawbill and did day trips in search of fish and bears on the Lady Chain, up Kelso River, and to the East of Sawbill. If you have never been and have no gear and no idea what you might need, talk to me. I have extra gear: tent, sleeping bags, air mats, packs, fishing poles, eating utensils, etc. Bring your own water bottles (2). I prefer that we each bring our own food and I bring the freeze dried stuff that takes little time to cook. If you wish to lug along the weight you can bring whatever you like as long as you can fix it over a campstove. Caution: fires are sometimes banned due to dry conditions and danger of wildfires. So we might be limited to our campstove and fuel we bring. I have a tandem canoe or we can do solo boats. If using a kayak, a 14ft one is preferable to other models. Remember, no portage carts/wheels allowed---you must carry your boat and gear. I promise, no long portages but changes

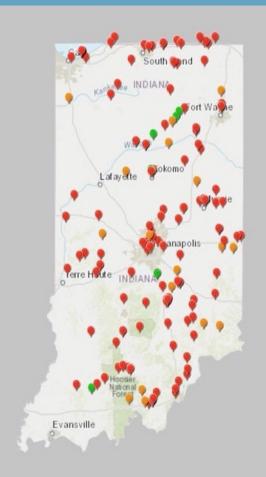

#### **LOCATION OF LOW HEAD DAMS**

MISSION STATEMENT: Initiate the removal of Low Head Dams in Indiana through public education and working directly with and engaging those organizations, clubs, schools, and public officials/legislature that can influence such results. River and water safety education is paramount in accomplishing this goal.

### <u>CURRENT WORKING INFORMATION REGARDING LOW</u> HEAD DAMS IN INDIANA:

Over 150 low head dams in Indiana. (the public is uninformed) Inadequate signage signaling the approaching dam. Little or no information available regarding the location of these dams to unsuspecting paddlers...and the dangers of encountering

DNR has designed an interactive app showing location of all known low head dams in Indiana

Many of the LHD are on private property requiring education and diplomatic negotiations with the owners...(maybe, offer incentives)

Many Indiana legislators may be uniformed regarding this issue: educate

Average age of drowning in a low head dam accident is 20.5 years.(youth education is paramount)

24 incidents in Indiana LHDs in 2017: 6 deaths and 18 recovered rescues

#### THE HOOSIER CANOE AND KAYAK CLUB'S GOALS IN THIS PROJECT

Outreach to the paddling and on-water recreational clubs, organizations, liveries, etc, in Indiana by: working independently but cooperatively with the DNR & Silver Jackets.

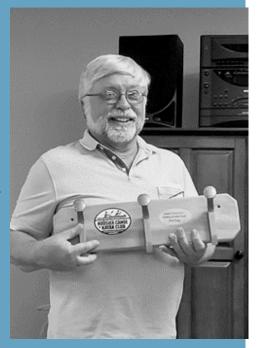
